

Insurance requirements for WA Cares contracts

The WA Cares Fund follows guidance from the Office of Financial Management when setting insurance requirements for providers. Before we can sign a contract with you, you must provide proof that you have the required liability insurance.

TYPES OF INSURANCE, AMOUNTS AND EXCEPTIONS

General liability insurance

This policy may be referred to as general liability, commercial (general) liability, business liability, or premises liability. General liability is required for all contracts regardless of where services are provided. This type of insurance provides coverage for bodily injury, property damage, and contractual liability. See the additional insured section below for certificate of insurance statement requirements.

Coverage requirements

\$2 million each occurrence and \$4 million general aggregate.

Exception for small businesses

Coverage requirements are lowered for small businesses at \$1 million each occurrence, \$2 million general aggregate.

Providers that meet the definition of a small business as defined by [RCW 39.26.010 \(22\)](#) must complete form [DSHS 27-234](#), CCLS Small Business Self-Certification Statement, and submit it to the entity processing the application. Please note that home care agencies are not eligible for the small business exception.

Exception for sole proprietors

If provider is a sole proprietor with less than three contracts, they may instead use a supplemental, workplace or premises liability insurance that includes coverage for bodily injury and property damage where the work is performed, but only if it is attached to a professional liability policy. The coverage requirements for each of these policies are \$1 million each occurrence, \$1 million general aggregate.

Professional liability insurance

Professional liability insurance is required when a provider is expected to provide a professional service or requires a professional licensure or credentials. This includes all providers licensed or credentialed through the Department of Health and the Department of Social and Health Services. Impacted providers must have either professional liability insurance or errors and omissions insurance.

Coverage Requirements

\$1 million each occurrence and \$2 million general aggregate.



Business automobile insurance

This coverage is not required if provider does not transport clients. Business automobile insurance is required on all vehicles used to transport clients, including vehicles hired by the contractor or owned by the contractor's employees, volunteers, or others. See the additional insured section below for certificate of insurance statement requirements.

Coverage requirements

\$1 million per accident, combined single limit

ADDITIONAL INSURED

For general liability and business automobile insurance, the certificate of insurance statement must name the Department of Social and Health Services as an additional insured at the address PO Box 45600 Olympia, WA 98504.

- Suggested language, as stated in provider contracts: "The State of Washington, Dept. of Social & Health Services (DSHS), its elected and appointed officials, agents, and employees of the state shall be named as additional insureds."
- If contracting with an Area Agency on Aging, the provider must also name them as an additional insured on the policy. Providers can obtain the address needed directly from the Area Agency on Aging.

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

Umbrella policies and excess liability coverage

A general insurance policy plus an additional umbrella policy can be considered equivalent to the basic minimum. Umbrella insurance will be applied once the general liability policy is exhausted. Excess liability coverage will also increase the amount of the policy to which it applies, while the umbrella policy can provide additional coverage to more than one policy. Both can be used to reach liability limits.

Waivers

A waiver may be requested by the provider on all or part of the insurance requirements. The following services have department-approved waivers for some of these requirements.

- Adult family home services
- Dementia and behavioral supports
- Education and consultation
- Environmental modifications
- Skilled nursing (subcode of professional nursing services)
- Transportation
- Yardwork and snow removal

Depending on the service and location, the Department of Social and Health Services or an Area Agency on Aging may be responsible for processing your application.
